BEAVER ATHLETIC ASSOCIATION PORT HOPE

Hockey is a sport with longevity. The first recorded use of the word "hockey" was in 1363 by King Edward III of England.

While the origin of the word is not known, it is suspected that "hockey" comes from the French word "hoquet" meaning "shepherd's staff."

Of course these early mentions of hockey weren't referring to ice hockey, a sport that was adapted to the winter climates of North America in the late 19th century. By 1924 ice hockey was so popular that it became part of the Winter Olympics.

Governed by the International Ice Hockey Federation, hockey is widely regarded as the most popular years. Six men served as the sport in Canada, Finland, Latvia, the Czech Republic, and Slovakia.

To this day, all across Ontario, children and adults lace up their skates and head to ponds or rinks to "shoot some puck."

The Beaver Athletic Association (BAA) grew out of a previously existing group known as the West End Rink Club (Englishtown). In 1946 the constitution of the BAA was drafted, and an outdoor skating rink was built at the corner of Little Hope and Sullivan Streets.

It was originally formed by a three person executive; including Keith Carruthers, who was involved for 15

first coaches for the BAA: Wes Friar, Mitt Fleming, Jim Archibald, Ted Watts Sr., Howard McMann, and Gord Rose.

With both baseball and minor league hockey teams on the go, the BAA was a labour of love for those original coaches. But it soon proved to be too much, and the baseball teams unfortunately, were sent to the chopping block in favour of a sole focus on hockey.

A great success over the years, the BAA has even trained one of Port Hope's top exports in hockey: Jim Roberts - The Stanley Cup winner - played peewee hockey under the Beaver Athletics umbrella.

JOB SHADOW AT THE PHA

As part of my first semester at Durham College in the Library and Information Technician program, I had the opportunity to job shadow Archivist Erin Walsh at the Port Hope Archives every Friday afternoon for the last 6 weeks. I am a bit of a history buff, so it has been a very interesting experience learning about local Port Hope history and how documents are organized and preserved at an archives. My first Friday involved helping another Durham College student find information on local sports history for a report he was working on. We were able to find an old photo of a Port Hope baseball team circa 1890. Another highlight was learning how to research genealogical information. One donation contained an article that traced the Maybee family back to France in the 1500's. Last week, I discovered that the Great Farini (William Leonard Hunt)-a daredevil that walked across Niagara Falls on a tightrope in the late 1800's--was a citizen of Port Hope and is buried in Union Cemetery. Today, Erin and I sorted through a large donation of files from a local environmentalist. I came across a letter signed by Jean Cretien, then the Minister of Energy, Mines and Resources. Working at an archives is touching history firsthand How cool is that?


