225th Anniversary

This year marks the 225th anniversary of the arrival of the first settlers, to what is today called Port Hope. The name of the village near the mouth of the Ganaraska River was called Cochingomink, by the Mississauga who inhabited this area. Peter Smith, a trader arrived about 1778 and built a log house to the east of the river. He was a trapper and hunter and became well recognized among the Indigenous people as the fur trader of choice on the north shore of Lake Ontario. Smith enjoyed a monopoly and within a year of his arrival the name of the trading post village became Smith's Creek. In 1790 Smith left the area and another trader named Lawrence Herchimere assumed his position and occupied the log structure near the river.

Three United Empire Loyalist officers, Elias Smith, Jonathan Walton and Abraham Walton were granted their petition in October of 1792 and acquired the Crown lands in the new Township of Hope. It was not until August 26, 1797 that Jonathan and Elias received the patent to the town property, subject to the condition that they construct a grist mill and saw mill on the site. The first Crown grants that were issued in new settlements in Upper Canada did not necessarily go to the first settlers and inhabitants of the land.

It was not until June 1793 that the first white families arrived to settle in the area. There are a number of different stories associated with the arrival of the four founding families to Smith's Creek. Most believe that these families, totaling 27 people, arrived on June 8, 1793 aboard the Mississaga, a small government schooner armed with six cannon. The group consisted of



COMMUNITY HISTORY
HAPPENS HERE!

Another tale indicates that James Stevens and a few men made their way on foot from Newark (Niagara on the Lake) while driving a herd of cattle and arrived in Smith's Creek on June 3rd. The remainder of the group arrived on the 8th. Although the stories differ somewhat it is certain that these four early families arrived sometime in early June of 1793.

By late summer the surveyors were able to lay out half of the township before they were struck with illness. They ceased their work and returned to Newark for the winter. The following spring the surveying of Hope Township was completed by Iredell. Harris took possession of Lot 3 and Ashford of Lot 1 of the 1st Concession, and Stevens had Lot 2 and Johnson Lot 1 of the 2nd Concession. These early families acquired additional lands in the township as time went on. By late 1797 Smith and Walton had settled 40 families in the Township.

Joseph Shuter Smith was the grandson of town founder Elias Smith, and son of John David Smith, a prominent local businessman and politician, also known for building the Bluestone house.

Joseph Shuter Smith was born in 1835 in Port Hope. He attended the St. John's Military Academy in Quebec as a child, and in 1856 was an officer in the Durham Regiment. He would marry Elizabeth Hall Ward of Port Hope in 1861, and worked in engineering in New York. After retiring, he lived at the Bluestone House and researched and wrote the genealogical history of the Smith family, which is now in the Archives' collection.
